- 1 local election officials and legislatures to decide when
- 2 they become mandatory for particular jurisdictions and
- 3 they can, at that time, take into account how much of
- 4 this can be accomplished within a given time frame, et
- 5 cetera, so perhaps we're trying to take on too much of
- 6 the burden of the transition issues that, in fact, our
- 7 responsibility is to set the standards for the features
- 8 and the performance requirements that are needed and
- 9 then let that -- let others decide when these can
- 10 actually be implemented.
- 11 Dr. Schutzer?
- 12 MALE: No, but I was suggesting that you may
- 13 not wanna specify a memoryless programmableless printer.
- 14 You may, in fact, want to allow that but provide
- 15 sufficient guidance in how to test that, which gets
- 16 involved all the things that the (indiscernible) group
- 17 for the processors and the programs you're gonna have to
- 18 spec the source code, make sure it hasn't changed or
- 19 that kind of thing, but it can be done.
- 20 MALE: Mr. Chairman, I must respectfully
- 21 disagree, in part, with your statement, and I think it's
- 22 important that we differentiate your role as Director of

- 1 NIST from your role as Chairman of this committee. I
- 2 agree that NIST is tasked with providing technical
- 3 expertise and developing standards, and NIST has no role
- 4 in assisting either the EAC or states and local
- 5 governments with the issues of transition. However, the
- 6 Technical Guidelines Development Committee as a body, is
- 7 expected to give recommendations to the EAC, not only on
- 8 standards based on our work with NIST, but I think that
- 9 it extends to issues such as transition. As been said
- 10 many times, there are number of jurisdictions waiting
- 11 for guidance to come out of this group as to how they're
- 12 going to comply with HAVA, how they're going to spend
- 13 their HAVA dollars, and I don't think it's inappropriate
- 14 for this group to give the EAC a recommendation on how
- 15 to best do that.
- 16 MALE: John -- I would take that a step
- 17 further and say that it's not only -- not inappropriate;
- 18 it's almost mandatory. I can quantify that for you a
- 19 little bit. There are over 48 million people in this
- 20 country today that -- that vote on punch card and lever
- 21 voting machines. They have been directed by HAVA that
- 22 they've got to do something about that. That's 615
